

In 1998, The WILD Foundation organized the 6th World Wilderness Congress in Bangalore, India. A resolution passed during the plenary session of this Congress confirmed the importance of the Olive Ridley nesting grounds along the Orissa Coast and the need to safeguard this world treasure. For many years, WILD has worked with local and national groups in India towards this end.
